# Post-Yeshiva and Seminary Reading List

#### **INTRODUCTION**

- 1. This suggested reading list has evolved in response to the demand from both young women and men leaving seminary and yeshiva and from older students for a guide to how to continue their Jewish reading and learning once they leave the 'bubble' of Yeshiva/Seminary life.
- 2. There are tens of thousands of wonderful sefarim on the market and my list is not intended to be comprehensive or definitive. It also unavoidably reflects my own particular tastes. Many of these are books have had and continue to have a significant impact on me, and they could be helpful for a broad range of students. The list is aimed at an intelligent (although not necessarily 'academic'1) student who is interested in seeing a range of perspectives and approaches. Inevitably, given the broad range of halachic and hashkafic approaches within the contemporary orthodox world, not every book will appeal to every reader. Some will be too 'academic' for some people and some will be too 'frummy' for others. Individuals can, and should, seek the advice of their own religious mentors as to what material will best suit them personally. I also recommend that you do your own on-line research about the authors I have listed. Many of them have written and audio shiurim on line and you can get your own feel for their style and substance. One of the additions I have made to this updated list is links in the footnotes for books reviews.
- 3. This list is not short, but don't be overwhelmed. You don't have to read them all! I have divided the list into over 30 categories. Look into the areas you're most interested in and try some out.

I am conscious that my own purview now includes more academic scholarship, due partly to the doctorate I am currently (2024) pursuing at YU. By definition, the academic perspective is not religiously motivated. In some areas it will present views which are wholly incompatible with Orthodox thought. In others, the lines are blurred (which may be even more challenging). In yet others, the academic scholarship is entirely consistent with traditional Orthodox hashkafa and may indeed be an important resource in deepening religious commitment. I have indicated in my notes where works are of an academic nature and the reader should consult with their own religious advisors on which books would be helpful for them.

4. This list is limited to books, rather than digital and on-line resources, although I have flagged a few websites in my footnotes. Many students today are more likely to look on-line before opening a sefer. I hope to keep this updated fairly regularly.

- 5. I have purposely limited the recommendations to secondary sources, mostly in English. I have also included a few Hebrew sefarim which should be accessible (at least to some degree) by many yeshiva/seminary leavers.
- 7. Students should always look to the primary sources Tanach, Gemara, Midrash, Rishonim, Acharonim and their respective commentaries where they are able. I have not included these classics (such as the Sefer HaChinuch, the Kuzari etc) in my list but HUNDREDS of these primary sources are now available in English translation and I strongly advise that you read them.
- 8. Most of the books on this list are available from Jewish book stores<sup>2</sup> or from online stores both Jewish (eg., Maggid/Koren, Mosaica, Feldheim, Artscroll etc) and Amazon. If you click the link on the title, it will take you to amazon.com and I will receive a small commission ©

As in all such works, a good science background (or someone to advise you who knows their science) is always recommended to check that the science data is up-to-date and correctly represented.
